Place Plans are a roadmap to guiding the delivery of a shared vision that is developed through collaboration between community and Council.

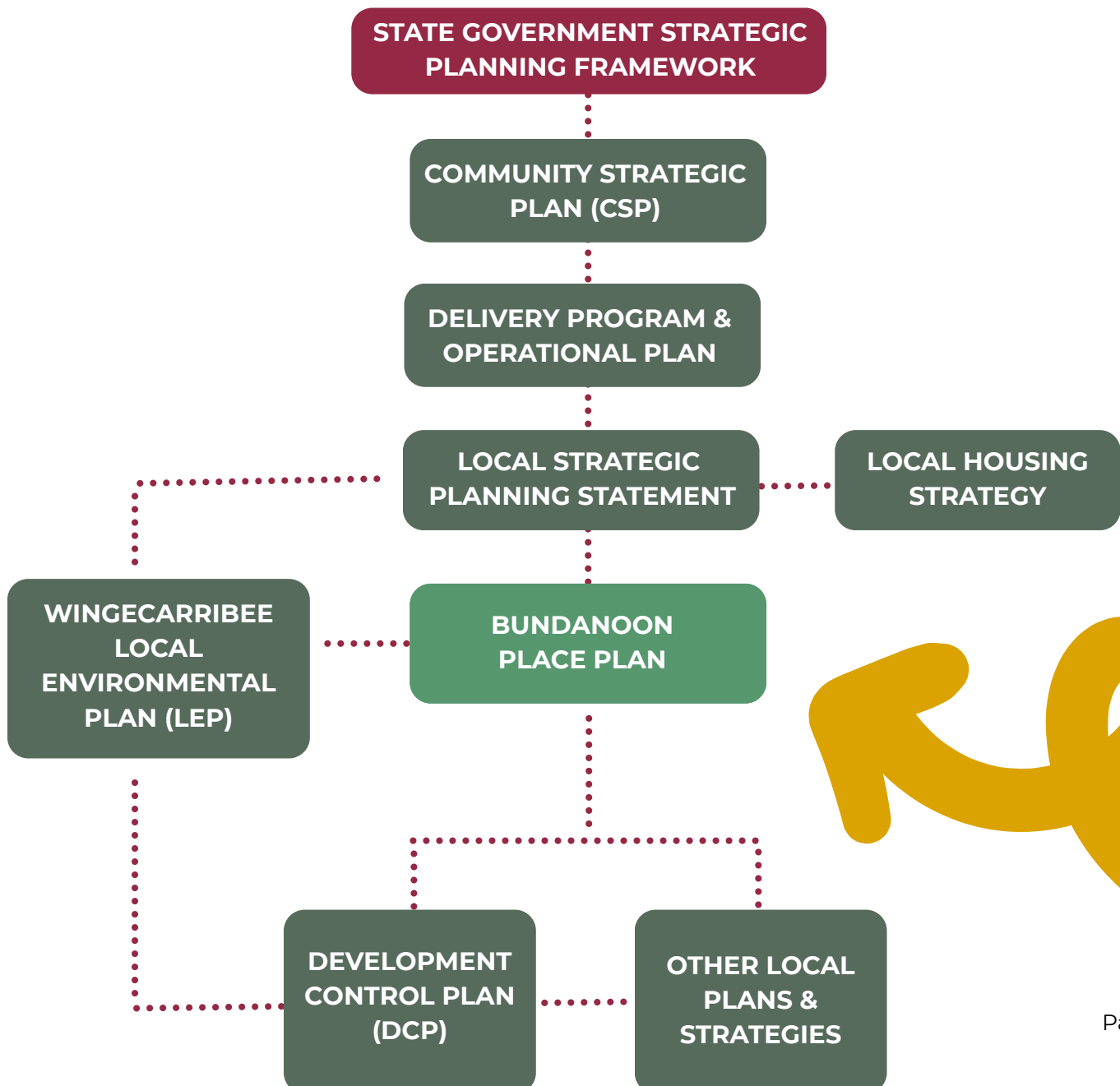
Place Plans address the environmental, economic, social and cultural needs while protecting and enhancing the unique character of a place.

WHERE DOES THE PLACE PLAN SIT?



Strategic Framework

The Place Plan sits within a broader strategic network, building on from other plans and strategies, while also echoing the ideas and priorities of the community.



FROM THEN TO NOW...

Bundanoon is situated where the lands of the Gundungurra and Dharawal people meet, and north of one of New South Wales' largest parks, Morton National Park, made of lush rainforests, panoramic lookouts, and home to the famous Gullies – dramatic, steep sandstone gorges – that define the natural landscape of the region. The Gundungurra people described these deep and spectacular Gullies, 'boon-doo-noon', which is how the township as we know it today, came to be known.

As rich in natural resources as it is in beauty, the area had supplies of coal, sandstone, and timber, which after European settlement in the late 1860s, and the completion of the railway route to Goulburn in 1868, greatly aided construction and economic development. It was in the late 1880s that shops, businesses, and guest houses were built, and the area became a popular tourist destination for visitors from Sydney. The city dwellers came for an escape to nature, to see the scenery at Morton National Park, go walking, riding, play tennis or golf, and swim in the Paddy's River.

The famous Gullies continue to attract visitors, with tourism remaining an important part of the local economy. The village is known for its bushwalking and nature-based experiences, heritage character and welcoming village atmosphere, and is home to well-loved events such as Brigadoon - the Bundanoon Scottish Gathering that has become an annual event since the late 1970's, and the Bundanoon Folk Festival.

The community is proud to call Bundanoon home and welcomes visitors to experience its natural beauty and vibrant village life. A strong volunteer culture, appreciation of the environment and nature, and a deep sense of community spirit are at the heart of Bundanoon.

VILLAGE SNAPSHOT

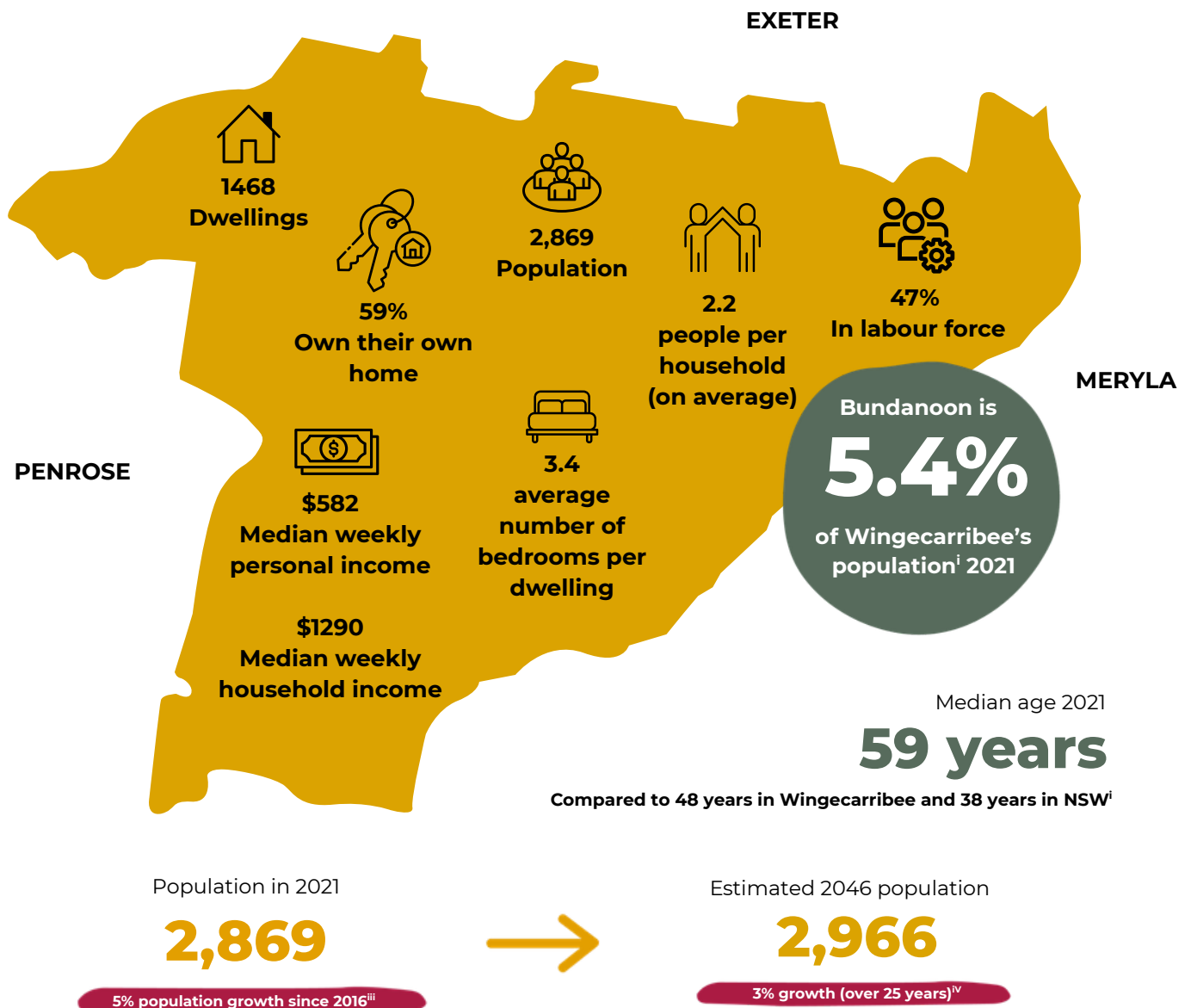
Bundanoon NSW has a population of 2,869ⁱ. The population is notably older, with 36% aged 65 and over, compared to the national average of 15.8%. This is reflected in lower workforce participation ratesⁱ.

An average home in Bundanoon is owned outright by couples without childrenⁱ. Separate or detached houses are common in Bundanoon and the area is mostly National Parks and Nature Reserves (34.75%), Environmental Conservation (26.5%) and Rural Landscape (12.93%)ⁱⁱ.

ENGAGEMENT SUMMARY

This Place Plan has been shaped through a collaborative process, bringing together local knowledge, ideas and aspirations to create a shared vision for the future.

To reflect local priorities, we connected with the community through three rounds of engagement, each building on the last to listen, test ideas and refine the direction together.

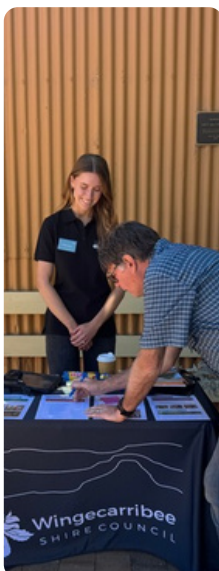
We started by listening, inviting the community to share what they value most about the village, the challenges they experience and their hopes for the future. These insights helped shape a shared vision and a draft set of Place Initiatives.

To continue the conversation, an Ideas Pack was shared with the community, inviting everyone to provide feedback on the ideas that resonated, those that could be strengthened and anything else that should be considered.

This feedback informed the draft Place Plan, which was placed on public exhibition for further community review and comment. The feedback received during Round Three was then used to refine the Plan before adoption, ensuring it reflects what matters most to the community and key stakeholders.

HOW WE ENGAGED

Engagement took place over three rounds and included student activities, interactive workshops, drop-in sessions, surveys and a range of other opportunities to encourage broad community participation. 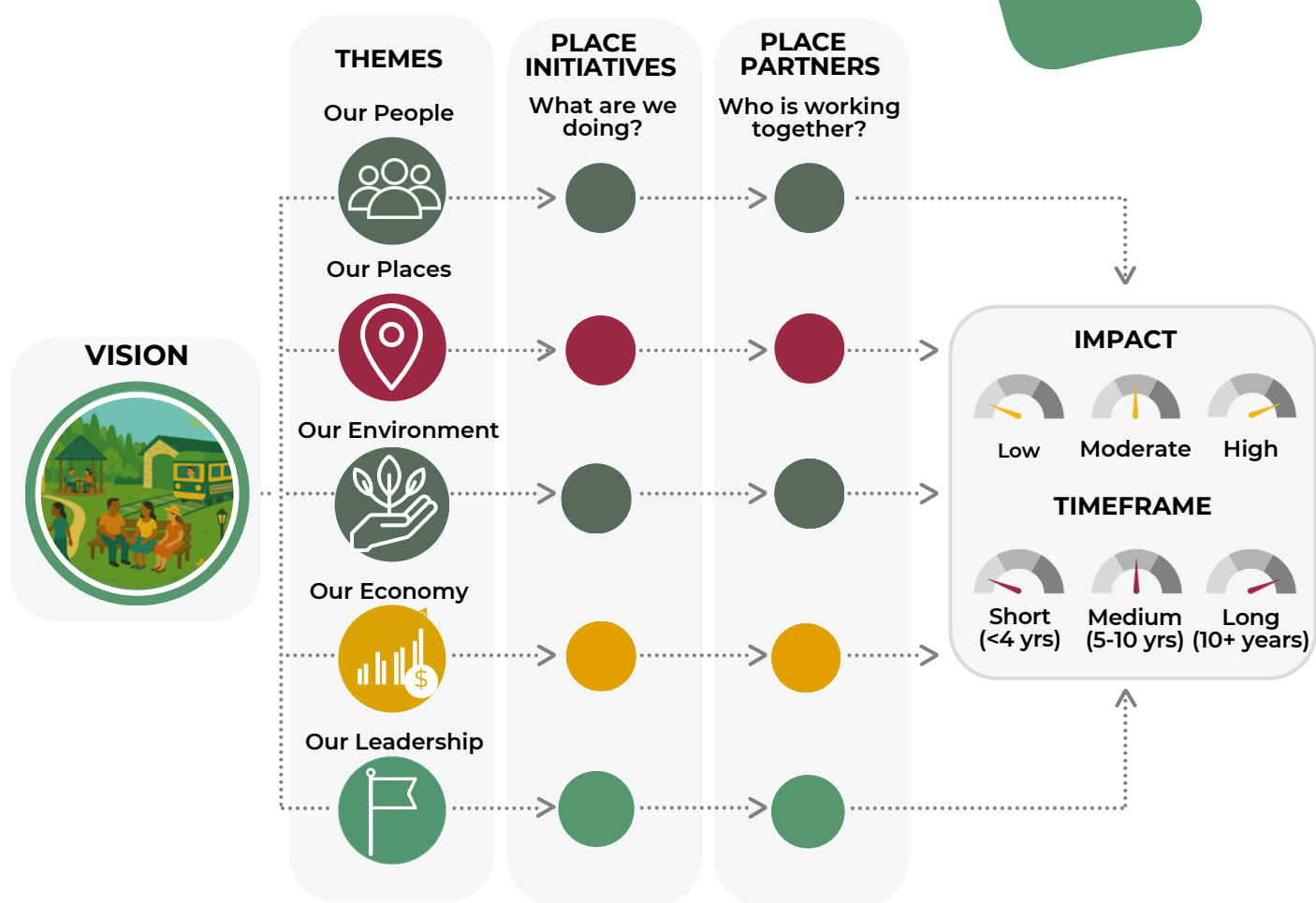

PLACE INITIATIVES

The Place Initiatives have been shaped by community feedback during all three rounds of community and stakeholder engagement. They collectively aim to reflect what matters most to you and provide a clear direction for future actions and priorities in Bundanoon.

IMPACT

The Place Initiatives have been scaled as **high, moderate or low** impact to reflect their anticipated reach and benefit across the community. This assessment considers factors such as how widely the benefits are felt, alignment with community feedback, and the contribution each initiative makes to safety and everyday life in Bundanoon. A lower impact rating reflects more targeted or localised benefits, rather than reduced importance.

TIMEFRAME

An indicative timeframe has been identified for each Place Initiative, taking into account the approximate time required to coordinate with relevant agencies and stakeholders, and to plan and deliver the proposed works. Short Term initiatives may be incorporated into Council's Delivery Program and Operational Plan where appropriate.

- **Short Term** (1-4 years)
- **Medium Term** (5-10 years)
- **Long Term** (10-20 years+)



PLACE PARTNERS

Guiding a shared vision...

Place Partners identifies the stakeholders working together to guide the delivery of the delivery of the Place Initiatives and to bring the shared vision for the village to life. Their role may vary, from leading initiatives to advocating or partnering in delivery.



Bundanoon has a strong sense of community spirit and a vibrant volunteering network, supported by local groups and associations. These groups provide grassroots leadership by sharing local priorities, representing community interests, bringing people together, and advocating to Council, State agencies and service providers.

GOVERNANCE

Delivering the Place Plan together

Council has taken a leadership role in developing the Place Plan through an iterative engagement process with the Bundanoon community and key stakeholders. Shaped in partnership with the community, the Plan relies on shared commitment and collective action for its success.

ADVOCATE

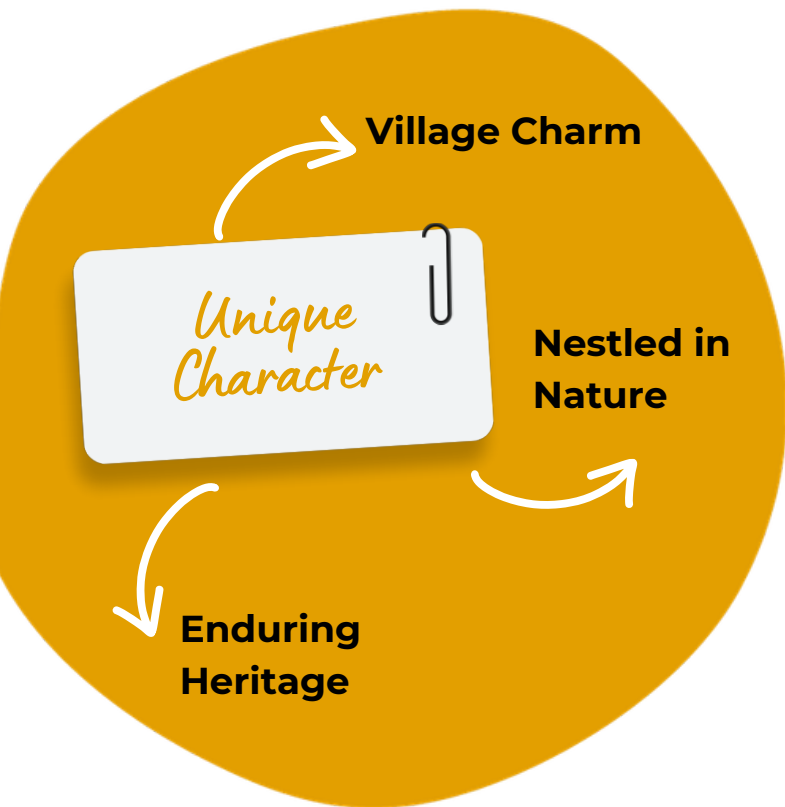
Championing community needs and aspirations by influencing and supporting decision making across all levels of government.

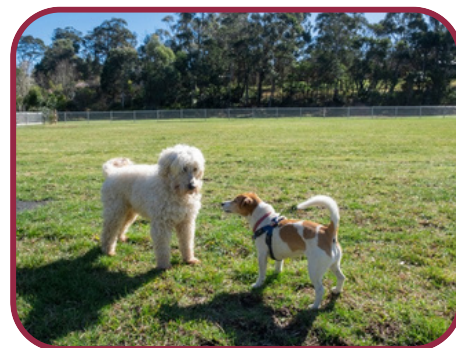
